

NEW STUDENT CHECKLIST



ACADEMIC PROGRAMS



BUSINESS MANAGEMENT

The Bachelor of Business Administration is designed to provide students with a rich, comprehensive, and challenging curriculum that encompasses the major fields of study in business management. Students take courses in several areas including Operations and Strategic Management, Marketing and Management, Finance, Economics, Quantitative Methods, and Leadership and Organizational Behavior.

COMMUNITY & HUMAN SERVICES

The Bachelor of Arts in Community and Human Services prepares students to matriculate into a graduate level program to pursue a career in service to others in individual or community settings. Through exposure to courses within sociology, psychology, and community and human services, students are able to understand the relationship between human needs and social conditions, master the art of advocacy, and integrate cultural competency with the foundational principles related to knowledge, skills, attitudes and values.



CONSERVATION BIOLOGY

The Bachelor of Science in Conservation Biology introduces students to scientific investigations into the untapped biodiversity of the Earth which have resulted in significant advancements in numerous fields, from farming and city planning, to innovations in renewable fuels and medicine. Vital to these investigations is the development and implementation of pragmatic approaches to managing biodiversity, including species and ecosystems management, captive breeding and reintroduction, genetic analysis and habitat restoration. The field of conservation biology accomplishes this by combining principles from multiple scientific disciplines (ecology, genetics, chemistry, taxonomy, physics and evolution) to develop plans and methods to do just that.

CONTEMPORARY JAZZ STUDIES

work designed to help students perform and manage careers as contemporary jazz practitioners. Students will cultivate musicianship and music literacy while developing a repertoire of contemporary and historical improvised and written music for live performance. Contemporary jazz studies students are required to study contemporary and creative perspectives of jazz in contexts that are visible, engaging, and socially relevant. The program equips students with fundamental jazz improvisation skills, and performance. Students collaborate with complementary disciplines, including music technology, dance, and improvisation performance varieties to prepare students for successful 21st century music careers.

The Bachelor of Arts in Contemporary Jazz Studies offers foundational course-



CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice provides students with a fundamental understanding of the American criminal justice system, the institutions and personnel which comprise the criminal justice system, and the theories of crime causation, offending, and rehabilitation. Designed according to standards established by the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences, the degree requires students to apply this foundational knowledge to the problems and the changing landscape of the criminal justice system.



EXERCISE SCIENCE

The Bachelor of Science in Exercise Science prepares students for careers in the four principle fitness sectors of sport, industry, health, and education. Students take courses in anatomy and physiology, the biomechanics of human movement. The application of these concepts is applied to exercise and therapeutic rehabilitation to promote healthy lifestyle in individuals and communities.

LAW

The Bachelor of Arts in Law program prepares graduates to advance to law school or pursue other career opportunities requiring a solid foundation in law such as paralegals, legal administrative assistants, and legal interns. The program is designed to equip students with the skills necessary to be able to think critically, write competently and persuasively about legal issues, utilize technology to perform legal research, and conduct themselves ethically in their professional and personal lives.



LIBERAL ARTS



The Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Arts is designed to provide students with a curriculum that is broad, flexible, and challenging, and to provide the means for degree recipients to be liberally educated and recognize the interrelatedness of knowledge. Students take courses from five core areas: Communications, Social Sciences, Humanities, Critical Reasoning and Analytic Methods, Science, Technology and the Environment. The program culminates in an experiential educational component via a Senior Capstone Seminar and either an independent research project or a 90-hour internship.

ORGANIZATIONAL LEADERSHIP

The Bachelor of Arts in Organizational Leadership offers a comprehensive, interdisciplinary curriculum which prepares students to assume an advanced leadership role in their current or future organization. Students develop and articulate a personal leadership approach and philosophy through courses designed to analyze and evaluate leadership practices, philosophies and theories through application of each to real-world situations.



RADIO. TELEVISION. AND NEW MEDIA



The Bachelor of Arts in Radio, Television, and New Media prepares students for careers in all types of media production. Students will have the opportunity to script, produce, direct, edit, manage, program, promote and distribute media. This course of study provides students with an in-depth look at the convergence of media, balancing between theory and applied studies. The program culminates in a Senior Internship capstone course where students master the skills necessary to be competitive in today's market.

SPORT MANAGEMENT

The Bachelor of Science in Sport Management provides the student with academic preparation and practical training for the sports industry. The sport management degree is designed to provide students with rich, comprehensive and challenging curriculum that prepares them for a career in sports.



THFATRE



The Bachelor of Arts at Lincoln College recognizes that theatre is a temporal collaborative art form that requires, encourages and solicits a broad range of talents and skill sets. Theater's methodology is delicately balanced between a deep inheritance of tradition and a reliance on innovation and immediacy; a true theater artist must realize the history of the form to effectively produce within as well as challenge and subvert the form.

FINANCIAL AID

FINANCIALAID.LINCOLNCOLLEGE.EDU

The Office of Financial Aid works with students to facilitate the process of receiving financial assistance. At Lincoln College, financial assistance consists of scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment. Assistance may be offered to students in single form or various combinations. Remember to apply each year for financial aid at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The FAFSA is open for completion on the 1st day of October each year. Lincoln College school code is 001709.

GRANTS are a form of financial aid that does not need to be repaid.

- Federal Pell Grant awarded to any student filing a FAFSA who meets financial need and eligibility criteria as outlined through a federal formula.
- Federal Supplemental Education Opportunity
 Grants (SEOG) Grants are awarded to Pell Grant
 eligible applicants on a first-come, first-served basis
 until funds are exhausted.
- VA Funding is available to qualified veterans and dependents of qualified veterans.
- Illinois State Monetary Award Program (MAP) for eligible students who meet the State of Illinois deadline

SCHOLARSHIPS are a form of gift-aid and do not require repayment. These can be awarded based on merit, but also be awarded based on financial need. Criteria such as academic achievement or athletic ability may apply.

LOANS are legal obligations that must be repaid. We encourage students to exhaust all other sources of aid first. Always remember to borrow responsibly.

FEDERAL WORK-STUDY EMPLOYMENT assists students with financial need by providing job opportunities that serve Lincoln College and the community. Work-study assignments are made based on financial need and student skills. Wages are based on the federal minimum wage and are paid twice monthly.

It is the student's responsibility to find an open position. Work-study is not a grant. Students should use the CareerLynx system (see pg. 30) to look up open positions and then contact the department to inquire about student employment.

SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS (SAP)

Federal regulations require that institutions monitor the academic progress of recipients of federal and state aid. Schools are required to withhold funds from students who do not make satisfactory and measurable progress toward their educational goal. Lincoln College students receiving Title VI (Pell Grant, SEOG Grant, Federal College Work-Study and all federal loans) and state funds (MAP Grant), whether or not they have received financial aid in the past, must meet the satisfactory progress. Satisfactory Academic Progress will be measured at the end of each semester. Students who fail to meet the minimum progress requirements will be placed on financial aid probation or suspension. First time Lincoln College students will be placed on probation after their first semester. For more information on SAP standards, please view the Academic Catalog at lincolncollege.educourse-catalog.

Important: If a student withdraws from classes or fails to attend a class for the term, eligibility for financial aid may be affected and may result in repayment of all or a portion of the student's financial aid. Remember to meet with your advisor and the financial aid office before considering a withdrawal from classes.

Verification: Some FAFSA's are selected for verification by the Department of Education. Verification must be completed before any financial aid can be disbursed on a student's account. If selected for verification you will be asked to log into MyLynx and select the "Verify my FAFSA" tab to create a log in. Once that is created, the information requested will display. We encourage students to call if assistance is needed.

WHERE YOU BILLS!

PAYYOUR BUSINESS OFFICE

The Business Office is the primary service for managing students' financial records and needs. Among the responsibilities are: account analysis, payment plan administration and more.

ACADEMIC FEES

Please see the Academic Catalog for Academic Fees.

BILLS

All student tuition bills will be mailed out once a month at around the middle of the month. Students can also view their account bill at any time in MyLynx.

PAYMENT PROCEDURES

Lincoln College provides two payment options: the Full Payment Plan and Five-Payment Plan. Should you not receive a bill, you are still responsible for paying by the deadline associated with the plan of your choice.

- Full Payment Plan allows you to pay tuition and fees before the first day of each semester. The fall semester payment is due August 1 and the spring semester payment is due January 1.
- Five-Payment Plan allows you to pay one-fifth of the semester tuition and fees on the 1st of each month. Fall semester payments are due monthly July through November. Spring semester payments are due monthly December through April. There is a surcharge per semester associated with this plan.

In person: You may visit the Business Office in the lower-level of the Harts Science Building. Business Office staff are available during normal business hours.

CREDIT/REFUNDS

Refund checks are processed once a week and can be picked up on Fridays. A student's credit refund is only available once all of their Financial Aid has been processed and funds received that create that credit balance.

STUDENT SHUTTLE:

The Lincoln College Shuttle operates on a fixed-deviated shuttle route that runs through historical downtown Lincoln and stops at a number of locations that provide access to shopping centers, restaurants, entertainment and recreation venues in and around the City of Lincoln. All students board and depart from the shuttle at the half circle drive in front of Heritage South Residence Hall and any of the designated pick-up and drop-off locations on the shuttle route.

AMTRAK SERVICE:

The Lincoln College Shuttle will provide students transportation to and from the Lincoln Amtrak station from 5:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m. Friday through Sunday. Students must board the shuttle 30 to 45 minutes before their train is scheduled to arrive at the Lincoln Amtrak station.

Students are responsible for the purchase of their Amtrak train tickets and can schedule their trip through Amtrak.com or through the Amtrak mobile app. Students are encouraged to monitor the Amtrak train schedule via smart phone app or online. It is not uncommon for Amtrak trains traveling through Lincoln to be delayed or canceled. The Amtrak mobile app can be downloaded from the Google Play Store or Apple Store depending on the type of mobile device.

TECHNOLOGY TERMINOLOGY AT LINCOLN COLLEGE

There may be some new terms you have not heard before as you acclimate yourself to the Lincoln College technology environment. In an effort to make your transition to Lincoln College as easy as possible, here are some of the common terms used on campus.

Canvas Learning Management System (LMS) is the system faculty and students use for online courses or as a supplement to a class that meets on campus. You may receive class content from your professor, receive assignments, submit your work, or have online discussions with your professor and other classmates.

LC-Secure wireless is the wireless access you will use to connect to the internet while you are on campus.

LC-Devices is the wireless access you will use to connect your devices such as TVs, game counsels, etc. while you are on campus.

Office 365 gives you full access to Microsoft Office which includes Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Outlook, Access, and Publisher that can be downloaded to your personal PC.

MyLynx is an information system where you will register for classes, access your unofficial transcripts, access your class schedule, view and pay your bills and much more.

Printing: Students may print academic materials from the College's computer labs for free, provided the materials being printed are directly related to the academic coursework for which the student is enrolled.

Single Sign-on is what you will use to log into all systems while at Lincoln College. Your username is usually your first initial, last name, the four last digits of your student ID number and then your password.

Office 365 Student Email is the email account used by students using the Single Login example above, the email format would be jsmith 1234. It is your Single Login followed by @stumail.lincolncollege.edu.

CONNECT TO OUR WIRELESS NETWORK

Lincoln College has two Wi-Fi networks available across the entire campus, LC-Open and LC-Secure. LC-Open is a guest network with minimal security. If you are able to connect to the LC-Secure network, please do so as it will be an overall better experience.

- 1. Choose LC-Secure from the list of wireless networks on your device.
- 2. See below for a list of information you may need to enter.
- 3. Click "Join," "Connect," "Save", or "OK."
- 4. If you are prompted to accept a security certificate, or if your device says there is a problem with the security certificate, choose "Accept" or "Connect."
- 5. You are now connected to LC-Secure

You may need to enter some, but not necessarily all, of the following information when connecting to LC-Secure.

- User name: this is your LynxNET username. This may be labeled as "Identity." On Windows, you may need to add "lincdom/" to the beginning of your username.
- Password: this is your LynxNET password.
- Phase 2 Authentication: choose "MSCHAPV2" or "MS-CHAP v2."
- Leave all other information as the default.

If you still have questions about the Wi-Fi network, or are having trouble logging in, please vist helpdesk.lincolncollege.edu and open an IT Ticket, and choose Network/ Wireless as the Help Topic.





Accessing the "Add/Drop" Functions

Students are able to find and select courses for their schedule using one of four different methods:

- Under the "Add/Drop" area of the "Course Catalog" portlet (Courses & Academics tab)
 - Add by Course Code
 - Add by Reference #
 - **Course Search**
- * From within the "My Degree Progress" portlet (Course & Academics tab)


To access "Add/Drop" area, select the "Courses and Academics" tab from the MyLynx header as shown to the right.



Once on the "Course & Academics" tab, scroll down until you see the "Course Catalog" portlet and click "Add/Drop" Courses".




This will open the view on the next page. Before choosing a method of registration, remember to change the Current Term pull-down so that it equals the Term for which you want to add courses. Most students will want to select the full "Year - Term" such as those listed below:




Registration through "Add by Course Code"

If you already know which specific courses you want to add, "Add by Course Code" may be the easiest registration method for you.



Registration through "Add by Reference #"

Using the Course Schedule booklet, you can also add courses by using their reference number. The reference number for a course is located just below the catalog number and just to the left of each individual section offered for that course




Registration through "Course Search"


Using "Course Search" you can search through the full schedule for a given term, selecting those you want to add by clicking a check box next to the particular section you wish to add. To start searching for courses, select "Course Search" tab in the "Add/Drop" view and enter the search criteria you want to use.

Add/Drop

Selecting "More Search Options" expands the search criteria you can use as shown on the next page. Changing only the Term and clicking "Search" will return all of the courses available for that Term, allowing you to page through the schedule with courses listed alphanumerically by catalog number and section.




Once you find the desired course in your search results, select it by clicking the "Add" check box in the left-hand column as shown below:



To finalize the additions, select the "Add Courses" button on the lower left below your search results (you may need to scroll to the bottom of the page). Adding the courses will refresh your screen, and the courses will appear below the view as shown in the image above under "Add by Course Code".

Registration through "My Degree Progress" portlet


Through the "My Degree Progress" portlet, you can 'drill down' through your program requirements and find courses that directly apply to a particular requirement area. There are a number of stages involved as you move from requirement areas to different requirement subgroups and steadily down to the specific required courses. To start the process, select the "View All Details" button under the "My Degree Progress" portlet.



As you work down through the groups, you will see increasingly detailed information about your requirements. At the lowest level, the screen will display the specific courses that can be used toward that requirement as shown to the right. Selecting "See available courses..." will open a course search screen, allowing you to search within the course schedule for courses meeting that requirement.



This course search works much like the "Course Search" registration method discussed on page 22 with the important difference that it is searching for an exact match to the course you specified on the previous screen. As with each registration method, you will need to change the Term pull-down to equal the one for which you wish to add courses.



Once your search results are returned, select the "Add" check box next to the course section you wish to add and then the "Add Course" button. Added courses will appear below the view as shown in the image above under "Add by Course Code."

Registration Errors and "Course Not Yet Registered" Messages

Occasionally, you may try to add a course and receive an "Unauthorized Course Entry" message. An "Unauthorized Course Entry" message could be triggered by several different conditions:


You may not have a prerequisite or co-requisite requirement

The course may meet at a location different from those for which you are authorized to register.

You may have tried to add a course that conflicts with another, already registered, course.

When/if you do run into an "Unauthorized Course Entry" message, the message will display just above your registered courses and look like the image below:

The message will indicate why you were not able to add the course and offer a suggestion on how to resolve the error. If you believe that the "Unauthorized Course Entry" message is itself an error, please consult with your academic advisor and/or the Registrar's Office.




Once you are registered, your academic advisor will need to approve your schedule before it is considered "complete." Your advisor may contact you with questions or concerns before approving your schedule, especially if your registered courses are different from the ones your advisor recommended. Please remember that you, as the student, are primarily responsible for course selection and making progress toward completion of your degree program. Departing from the course schedule worked out in partnership with your advisor may delay your graduation.

Dropping Registered Courses

In the event you need to drop one or more of your registered courses, you can do so from within the "Add/Drop" area of the "Course Catalog" portlet. As with each of the registration methods discussed on the previous pages, click on the "Add/Drop" button under "Add/Drop" to access the drop function.



Your registered courses will display alphanumerically by catalog number and section. If you are still allowed to drop a course without assistance from your academic advisor, a "Drop" check box will appear just to the left of each course. To drop a course, click the check box next to the course you wish to drop and then the "Drop Course(s)" button just below your list of courses.



Students are strongly advised to consult with their academic advisor and Financial Aid before dropping one or more courses

ACADEMIC ADVISING ADVISING.LINCOLNCOLLEGE.EDU

Every Lincoln College student is assigned an advisor whose primary goals are assisting students to realize their maximum potential and helping students determine and attain their educational and career objectives. Your academic advisor will help orient you to college work, assist you with registration and scheduling of classes, monitor your academic progress and refer you to faculty and student services staff for necessary help.

ADVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Advisors are key to a student's educational experience. They help guide students through academic decisions, personal growth and development. Advisors do more than just help students register for classes; they are one of the primary reasons a student chooses to stay at Lincoln College. Your advisor will:

Be knowledgeable about degree and program requirements and explain this information to you in a clear and concise manner.

Offer advice on course selection and help students develop an academic plan that moves them toward graduation.

Keep regular office hours and be available for appointments.

Contact students regarding concerns about their attendance or grades.

Help students clarify goals and discuss actions necessary to meet those goals.

Monitor student progress and keep advising records and meeting notes.

Stay abreast of current advising policies, procedures and program changes.

Refer students to appropriate campus resources as needed (e.g., Academic Success Center, Student Counseling, etc.).

Guide, encourage and support student development while preparing them for the next step in their academic journey.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- Participate in advising by preparing for advisor meetings, asking questions, and sharing thoughts, concerns and ideas with the advisor.
- Check student email account regularly, respond to advisor's email, voice mail, or text message in a timely manner and notify advisor if contact information changes.
- Make and keep advising appointments, and let your advisor know ahead of time if the appointment must be canceled.
- Reflect on goals (educational and personal) and ask your advisor to help you develop a plan to reach those goals.
- Attempt to learn and understand the core curriculum and requirements for intended program of study.
- Be aware of the academic deadlines through the semester, and understand the consequences for missing those deadlines (drop/add deadlines, W/WF deadlines, etc.).
- Know how to use the MyLynx and Canvas systems to obtain information necessary for classes (course syllabi, assignments, handouts or PowerPoint slides), review grades and course attendance, and to view course schedules.
- Be knowledgeable about policies, procedures, and resources on campus and ask questions when needed
- Be open and willing to consider advice from an advisor, faculty or other mentors on campus.



Lincoln College is committed to providing equal access to all College programs and services. The mission of the Office for Disability Services (ODS) is to ensure full and equal participation for students with disabilities by providing facilitators, programs and services that will support and enhance an individual's ability to achieve their academic and personal goals. ODS is dedicated to encouraging self-advocacy, promoting equal access, and working with individuals to determine and establish appropriate accommodations.

A student with a disability who has been accepted to Lincoln College is encouraged to contact the Office of Disability Services. Students are not required to make this contact, nor will the contact force students to use accommodation services. However, if students wish to use disability-related accommodations at Lincoln College, they must complete the following four-step process:



- 1. Contact the Office of Disability Services
- 2. Complete and submit registration documents at lcods.lincolncollege.edu and provide appropriate documentation to establish eligibility for services
 - NOTE: Documentation should come from the licensed, clinical professional who diagnosed or is treating the disability and should be recent enough to identify the current impact of the disability (generally within the past 3 to 5 years). The documentation should include a diagnostic statement identifying the disability, a description of the current impact of the disability, treatments currently in use, the expected progression of the disability over time, and recommendations on ways to mitigate the impact of the disability. Generally, a high school IEP or 504 plan does not constitute adequate documentation.
- 3. Schedule an ODS intake interview to discuss the impacts of the disability, academic goals, an accommodation history, and accommodation process.
- 4. Work with ODS to develop and accommodation plan. Upon student request, ODS will provide letters for instructors identifying the student's accommodations.

ACCESS PROGRAM

In addition to the services available through the Office of Disability Services, students who have a disability that impacts executive function (e.g., ADHD) may elect to enroll in the supplemental, fee-for-services Access Program.

The Access Program uses an established 3-pronged approach to build the foundation for academic success. Through a focus on academics, individual attention, and a personalized community of support, the Access Program has a demonstrable record of success.

Students in the program are paired with a professional Access Coach who meets with the student throughout the semester to provide guidance and support. Coaches keep abreast of students' academic progress as well as upcoming dates and deadlines and work with students to develop effective ways to approach assignments and projects. Additionally, Access Coaches maintain regular communication with the entire campus community and work closely with faculty to help keep students current with dates of assignments, tests, and course expectations. Coaches also provide parents regular electronic updates on their student's academic progress.

Lincoln College wants to ensure all conditionally accepted students succeed with their transition to college. To offer assistance prior to the start of the fall semester, Lincoln College *requires* all conditionally admitted students to *attend and fully participate* in the Enrichment Academy, formerly known as The Summer Bridge Program. Enrichment Academy is designed to help you succeed at Lincoln College, so failure to attend or participate may impact your fall acceptance status.

The Enrichment Academy runs the week prior to Orientation and throughout your entire first semester. It is packed with everything you need for a successful start to your first semester of college. The Enrichment Academy is offered at no cost to you and will provide you with the opportunity to develop the academic and social skills that you will need in college.

Before you can take advantage of the Enrichment Academy, you must complete the following:



FRESHMAN SEMINAR (IDS 105)


Freshman Seminar (IDS 105) is a course designed to act as an academic, cultural, and social transition to college. Freshmen Seminar provides a platform for promoting intellectual, personal, academic and social growth and success. The course introduces students to:

- College policies, procedures and services
- Academic and career choices
- Helps students clarify their purpose, meaning, and direction
- Rigor expected of college students through intellectual discussions, activities and reading and writing assignments

Students entering Lincoln College with 15 college credits or less are required to take Freshman Seminar their first semester. Students entering Lincoln College with more than 15.1 - 45 credits are eligible to enroll in the course but are not required to.

Residential Life offers a living and learning environment committed to the academic success and personal growth of our residents. Students can choose to live on an academic theme housing floor—where students are clustered by academic major or special interest, making it easy to form study groups and make friends. Our friendly and supportive hall staff are available 24 hours a day to provide guidance and support to all students.

When you get to campus don't forget to introduce yourself to your hall staff, which consists of the individuals described below:

- Resident Assistant (RA): Peers who live on each floor in the residence halls that are dedicated to helping students succeed both socially and academically at Lincoln College.
- Residence Hall Director (RHD): A full-time Masters level professional or pursuing a Master's degree who lives on campus. The Residence Hall Director's full-time job is to support student success through mentoring, leadership development, skill building, and is the primary administrator for two to three residence halls.

RESIDENCE HALLS' AMENITIES INCLUDE:

RESIDENCE HALL CLOSINGS

HOUSING ASSIGNMENTS

Students are assigned once their housing deposit is paid and a housing questionnaire is completed. Housing questionnaires provide an opportunity for students to list their living preferences including building locations, living lifestyles, roommate choice and other preferences. RESIDENCE HALL ASSOCIATION

Residence Hall Association is the governing organization for the residence halls. 

CREEKSIDE

Creekside, Lincoln College's Outdoor Center for Environmental Education, is an innovative 104-acre educational site recognized by the scientific community for its biological diversity and geological and archeological significance. The Center features a lecture pavilion, insectarium, greenhouse, restored tall grass prairie, native gardens, demonstration pond, counsel ring fire pit, solar and wind energy developments, storm water management and rain garden, nature trails and access to Sugar Creek.

In addition to being used for Lincoln College science curriculum, Creekside is available to area educators for teaching students of all ages about land use, environmental science and conservation, research projects, and to the general public for walking and recreation.

Creekside has free parking and portable restroom facilities. Boardwalks and sidewalks make the site accessible.



PEOPLE OF THE PAST BOARDWALK

A key feature of Creekside is the "People of the Past Boardwalk" project which is an accessible interpretive trail to transport visitors hundreds of years into the past. As persons walk along the boardwalk, they also walk back in time from the present. The first phase of the project showcases pioneer and Kickapoo and Mississippi Native American cultures. Eventually, the boardwalk will extend back to the era of the woolly mammoth. Currently the boardwalk extends to the Wibben Overlook that gives visitors an elevated vantage point to view Sugar Creek.



In 2005, Lincoln College student Judd McCullum discovered Illinois' largest woolly mammoth fossil, large tusk and parts of another tusk, during a Lincoln College Environmental Biology field trip to Sugar Creek. The tusk is on permanent display at the McKinstry Memorial Library. In 2006, Professor Dennis Campbell discovered a woolly mammoth tooth at the site. This tooth, the previous tusk, and additional material found in 2009 are carbon-14 dated to 11,500 years ago, making this mammoth one of the last woolly mammoths on Earth.





DIRECTIONS

Creekside is located along Sugar Creek, about five miles north of Lincoln at 1234 County Road 2000N. Directions: From I-55 take exit 133 toward Lincoln. Turn left onto North Lincoln Parkway and travel three miles. Turn right on 1250th Ave. (Nicholson Road) and travel 3.1 miles (passing over I-55, past the Epperson Subdivision and over Kickapoo Creek). Turn left on 2000th St. (the second left after Kickapoo Creek) and travel about half a mile. Turn right onto the gravel road marked Small-Edwards Trace that leads to Creekside.
